What challenges do Cooperative Extension and/or Family & Consumer Sciences pose in your state?

1. The decrease in number of FCS extension educators in the state and changing state demographics has led to a shift in priorities to ensure that our health and wellness programs are delivered to individuals who need them the most. Nationally, the U.S. government could decrease funding to programs that target low-income and underserved audiences, resulting in a decrease in the size of our Eat Smart Idaho program which is funded by USDA. With the increasing Hispanic population and more refugees coming into Idaho, Extension programs must reach out to these individuals and develop culturally appropriate materials.
